Kagzipura Museum Project

Kagzipura village, a medieval site located near Devgiri Fort, Chh. Sambhajinagar was historically renowned for its handmade paper production. This eco-friendly craft, which uses recycled clothes instead of wood pulp, is now in decline. To preserve this craft and to showcase the history of handmade paper, a museum is being constructed at Kagzipura village. The fortification of the museum site has been completed, and construction of the museum building will commence soon.



Paithani Revival Project

Chh. Sambhajinagar is famous for its ancient silk fabric, the Paithani Saree, originating from the village of Paithan. Paithani sarees, much like the renowned Banarasi and Kanjivaram silk sarees, boast a rich heritage that spans thousands of years. However, the number of Paithani weavers is dwindling.

To revitalize and promote this traditional art, the Paithani Revival Project has been initiated by the Company. This project includes the establishment of a Paithani Weaving Training Centre, where individuals will be trained in hand weaving on handlooms, creating significant employment opportunities. This training centre will be located within the Kagzipura Museum premises.
